Strategic Direction

Thank you for your feedback last year about our strategic plan. The Board and Staff have considered this feedback and refined our goals for the next two years. The outline is on the back of this newsletter.

I would like to share with you a few initiatives this year we are excited about as a school as we continue to turn up the heat in our academic programmes while continuing to provide a range of sport, musical, cultural, and environmental opportunities for students.

Curriculum

We are continuing to strengthen our literacy and numeracy programmes ensuring clear progressions for learning are identified for each student, and they are making progress towards their goals. We have developed a document of 'signature practices' - those things we know contribute to using our resources for the best possible outcomes for student learning. Teachers have set goals and are working towards these.

- Keep an eye out for our Health programme consultation later in the year before this becomes a main topic focus in term 3.

Positive Inclusion

We have a significant focus on 'learner agency' - things like students setting goals, and getting feedback towards these goals. Teachers are making clear for students how each activity will contribute to learning.

Attendance - we need every child at school every day unless their illness or injury prevents this. Learning grows a little at a time each day - so every day at school is important.

Identity and Culture

Term 4 we have a focus on continuing to explore the history of our local area, and a planned visit to a marae at Ohinemutu. Students continue to learn basic te reo (Māori language) as part of their class programme. We have an extension group for Māori language and whakapapa funded by Ngati Whakaue.

Opportunities

We continue to develop our student leadership opportunities throughout the school. Our seniors have multiple opportunities for EOTC experiences over the year. Students in the three middle primary classes split into 4 smaller groups for a term each of gardening, music, textiles, and art on a Thursday morning. We intend to run electives in the first half of the year and look forward to parents and community members coming in to share a hobby or skill with our students.

Consultation: Students and whānau were invited to contribute ideas through a Google Form, and class discussions. Input was included from local iwi education plans and discussion groups. Teaching staff conducted a thematic analysis of feedback received to identify key strengths and ideas for growth, including both qualitative and quantitative analysis. The Board and teaching staff reviewed this analysis and reflected on the four big ideas above along side the development of annual planning for 2024 and 2025. A new strategic plan had already been consulted on and in place for 2022-2023, and so this renewed strategic plan has been more of a refining process, rather than a new development from scratch.
